#### **Letters from Leah**

The lectionary gospel for this year's Resurrection, our second pandemic Easter and first with Covid vaccines, although not enough to have life fully restored as we once knew it, leaving us in a perpetual state of hope and fear, is Mark. And it's perfect for this place we're in.

In Mark's gospel the women are met at the empty tomb, not with a risen Jesus, but with an angel, perhaps, or maybe just a young man in impeccably clean clothes, who shares the good news. The original ending to Mark's gospel is short and quick. It gets right to the point: The women leave this place of death in terror and amazement. They've received the antidote to death and yet they are still afraid. Hope and fear, terror, and amazement: we know these opposing dualities well. We know what is like to live with such ambiguity, with restoration both at hand and not yet within our grasp, with the reality of both resurrection life and still being afraid driving us. Originally, this was the end of the story. Mark's gospel ended at chapter 16, verse 8.

Originally, Easter ended in terror and amazement.

How unsatisfying, yet true.

Later communities elaborated, adding a broader ending. Not earlier than the 4th century, scholars surmise, a continuation of verse 8 surfaced. This elongated conclusion says that the women told Peter of what they saw at the tomb. Jesus also makes an appearance and sends them all out to proclaim the good news.

Later, the story got told in a different way, one that didn't leave us so unsettled.

And even that wasn't enough!

A longer ending with ten additional verses also exists. This version features Jesus not only appearing to the women, but also to disciples. He commissions the disciples and ascends to heaven. This ending is in no way ambiguous. There's no hope AND fear here, only hope with a postscript that assures us it all works out in the end. Here, there's no amazement coupled with terror. Why be afraid when Jesus shows up to take care of #allthethings? Here, in the longer ending of Mark's Gospel there is ONLY good news. It is clear. It is concise. It is comprehensive. It is, frankly, the kind of good news we wish we always had, the kind of good Back to Top

news we wish we had in terms of covid and every crucifixion we've ever experienced. We wish every tragedy and catastrophe, every personal pain and collective sorrow got restored and set right in 10 simple verses that plainly and clearly covered all the

bases with no room for questions or confusion or ambiguity of any kind. We always wish for the kind of resurrection that is devoid of the both/and, the kind that takes care of #allthethings.

We simply want a resurrection that IS -- full stop.

And yet we know that change happens in stages.

More often than not, restoration comes piecemeal. The resurrection happens over and over again until it is complete. We see that to be especially true with the pandemic as new rounds of vaccines become available. Anyone who's lived through grief, or overcome an addiction, or healed after a relationship fell apart knows this to be true. Easter is a season, not just a day. It's true in our faith as it is in our lives, and it's true in our lives as it is in our faith.



This year, for the Easter season which stretches between Easter and Pentecost, we're going to take a long look at the resurrection. Drawing from several sources, Pastor Connie, the Worship Team, and I are putting together a worship series called the "Way of Light: The Stations of the Resurrection." The way of light, or the Via Lucis as it is called, mirrors the Stations of the Cross but leads us out of death instead of towards it. As Connie, Kathy, Chase, Susan, and I discussed it, we liked the idea that we would have these 40 days to think about the power of the resurrection and journey into resurrected life, however that looks for us. Just as the 40 days of Lent are powerful, these 40 days of Light could prove to be just as powerful, especially considering what's going on in the world. We all welcomed the chance to think about how the resurrection unfolds over time both in life and in faith.

During this series, I will be drawing from several books about the Via Lucis. Three titles are of interest. Look them up and see if you'd like to use one for you own personal devotion time in the season after Easter:

- Journeying into Joy: Stations of the Resurrection by Andrew Walker
- Via Lucis: The Way of Light by Glenn Byer
- Via Lucis: Stations of Light by Nita Ng

Use this season to visit the places of resurrection in your life again and again and again.


One of the interesting things about this not-great time is how being forced to change and adapt has made us consider different ways of doing things. Some

#### A New LGBTQ+ Affirming Workshop is being Offered!



In 2020, Pastor Leah was invited to be part of the LGBTQ+ Homeless Workgroup under the auspices of the Champaign County Continuum of Service Providers to the Homeless (CSPH). In addition to advocacy, the workgroup has identified and developed a dozen different cultural competency trainings for direct service providers, educators, and the community in general. "LGBTQ & Religion" is the training Pastor Leah has developed. This training covers religious-based discrimination against LGBTQ people, particularly in social service settings, the impact religious stigma has on LGBTQ health

and wellbeing, and faith-based affirming practices. This workshop echoes some of the material offered in the Biblical Self-Defense Workshop but lifts up new statistics and takes Biblical interpretation a step further, not simply framing passages in context, but deriving affirming practices of faith from each. You are invited to attend this training on Sunday, April 11, at noon, in our Sunday morning Zoom room. After worship that day, grab lunch and come back for the training at noon. This training is open to the public. Look for publicity on social media and share. Invite your friends.

#### **Campus Ministry**

Campus Ministry invites everyone to join us April 16th at 7:00 for Queering Faith 4.0: Mythology and Futurism as Tools for Queer Theology. It will be an online conversation between Taj M. Smith and Dr. Gabrielle Bychowski moderated by Rev. Dr. Chris Davies. We will be discussing science fiction, fantasy, and worldbuilding as tools for developing a Queer theology. Taj M. Smith is a Black, transgender, Christian whose theology is heavily influenced by liberation theology, Queer theology, and science fiction. He will be discussing the power of science fiction and world building in Queer theology. Dr. Gabrielle Bychowski brings a historical lens with her specialization in medieval literature. She is no stranger to mythology and fantasy and will be discussing how these tools can help us form our theologies. She is an Anisfield-Wolf SAGES Fellow at Case Western Reserve University where she teaches courses on transgender and intersex history, disability culture, racism and medieval literature. Rev. Dr. Chris Davies, who has been a speaker at QF before, is returning to moderate the conversation. It is sure to be an amazing evening, and I hope everyone can join us. There is no cost, but there will be an option to donate to help offset technology costs. Campus Ministry will also be helping to lead worship on the April 25th where I am sure some of this conversation will return in a worship setting. Thank you for your support!!

We'll miss them and they'll miss us. This baby -- it's our first Jubilee Cafe baby whether it's born in India or just down the street. They will always be part of our Jubilee Cafe family and our CUCC community. May their family be blessed and know that they are loved. Always.



Choir may make plans to meet outdoors for masked, distanced singing. Email Kathy to get on the email/text list if we make a sudden weather-dependent plan!





#### **Adult Education and Small group Opportunity:**

#### "THE BIBLE TELLS ME SO" with Peter Enns

After Easter, CUCC is offering a 7-session small group, adult ed series using a film series from The Work of The People (whose fantastic videos we've used in worship all thru the pandemic) based on the work of Peter Enns. This is an opportunity for anyone who grew up being taught the Bible said one thing and now understand that what they were taught is not necessarily so. Our exevangelical and former Catholic CUCCers will especially appreciate this series.

The Work of the People says this about the series: What if the Bible is fine just the way it is? Not a well-behaved Bible, where everything lines up and makes sense, but the messy, troubling, and weird Bible we actually have? What if the Bible doesn't need to be protected and defended, but understood—just as it is? What if the real problem isn't the Bible but the false expectations, we sometimes bring to it? Perhaps, when we let the Bible be the Bible rather than what we expect it ought to be—or need it to be—we will find a deeper faith in the process. We hope these films with biblical scholar Peter Enns around the chapters in his book, *The Bible Tells Me So* will stir your imagination, deepen your trust in God, and that the Bible comes alive in new ways for you and your community. "



We are forming small groups now – simply email Carla (info@community-ucc.org) to let her know you'd like to participate. Groups will choose their own time to meet (online using CUCC's zoom account) and will be self-led, so consider if you would like to be a facilitator of a group. Each participant will receive the discussion guide which includes an opening prayer, intro to each session, and over a dozen discussion questions per film. There's more to discuss than your group could possibly talk about in a single session! This series will give you fodder for a long time. If you'd like to go deeper, read Peter Enns' book as well. Or, you can just show up (online) to a session, watch the video together, and discuss. Either way works!

- 2. Virtual Tutors Needed DREAAM House, a wonderful organization in town, describes themselves as "a community impact organization with a justice-informed mission to reduce the achievement and opportunity gaps among boys and young men. Since July 2015, DREAAM House has built a pre-kindergarten to college pipeline program for boys aimed at cultivating academic excellence and positive citizenship." You may know that Jubilee Café already provides a weekly meal to the students at DREAAM House. Well, DREAAM House has an additional need. They have a virtual tutoring program, matching willing community members with students at all levels of school, and recently signed up another 20 families in Rantoul, some of which have students that need tutoring. There will also be an additional need in the summer as their student numbers in Champaign increase during the summer. They ask that volunteers commit about an hour a week to tutoring. They will train you online in about an hour and a half and will make every effort to match stated needs of the students with your areas and grade levels of comfort for tutoring. If this is something that sounds interesting to you, please contact Jeanne and she will forward the information to the volunteer coordinator at DREAAM House. Since this is virtual, it is a pandemic safe opportunity to really be of service to someone!
